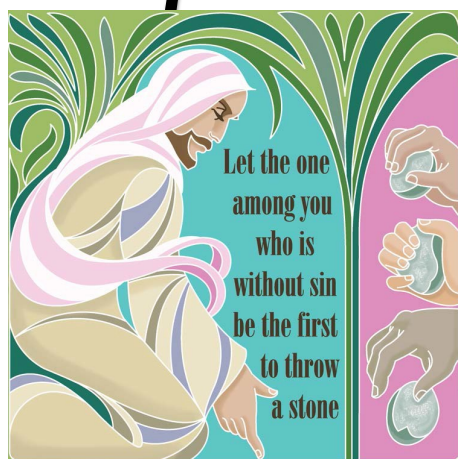

From Fr. Ted

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are now more than halfway in our Lenten journey and hopefully you have participated in some of the events and activities offered in our parishes for spiritual nourishment and renewal.

In our gospel this Sunday, the scribes and the Pharisees brought to Jesus a woman who had been caught in the act of adultery. St. John writes that they wanted to “test” Jesus on the issue of retribution so “they might have some charge to bring against him.” There were many incidents where they planned to set-up Jesus, to test and trap him, like in an issue with paying taxes, but Jesus is smarter than them.

This incident happened while Jesus was preaching, when suddenly, there was a rude interruption. The scribes and the Pharisees broke into the assembly, bringing a captive woman. They demanded a condemnatory judgement from Jesus. But the Lord said nothing. The inquisitors continued to press him for a verbal response. It was at this point that he made the statement: “He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone.” Jewish law treated adultery as a serious crime, one of the three gravest sins punishable by death. If Jesus said the woman must be pardoned, he would be accused of breaking the law of Moses. If he said the woman must be stoned, he would lose his reputation for being the merciful friend of sinners.

This was a trap laid for Christ. There was malicious intent here! So, Jesus initially gave a non-verbal response by writing something on the ground. Whatever Christ wrote on the ground had a powerful impact upon his critics. Silently they slipped away into the shadows, progressing from the older to the younger. This effect usually is interpreted as an indication that the Lord’s written message impacted the more mature first, and then the younger. It is hard to focus upon another’s sin when your own is exposed. Perhaps Jesus was writing down a list of the sins of the accusers standing before him. Jesus now turns the challenge towards his accusers. The Lord leaves the matter to their own consciences.

The accusers abandoned their prey. They were no match for the Son of God. The Lord rose and spoke to the woman. He inquired: “Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?” Then he added, “Neither do I condemn you.” Jesus both expresses mercy and strongly exhorts her to not sin again.

Pope Francis was once asked what he will do to people, lay or clergy who have homosexual orientation, and his response was “Who am I to Judge?” St. Luke 6:37, exhorts us: “Judge not, and you will not be judged; condemn not, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you will be forgiven.” We are expected to be forgiving people as we ourselves have been forgiven.

During Lent we are given another chance to repent and to try our best to sin no more. God’s grace enables us to confront our sin for what it is, and to turn back to Him with a repentant heart and a thankful spirit for His mercy and forgiveness. The scribes wished to condemn, while Jesus wished to forgive and to restore the sinner to health. His challenge to the woman involved a choice— go back to her sinful living or accept God’s forgiveness and offer of restoration and new life in his kingdom of peace and righteousness.

As we always say, “No one is perfect,” and so we need to be careful when we pass judgment on others. There is a secular saying: “Remember, when you point a finger at someone, there are three more fingers pointing back at you.”

Fasting and Abstinence During Lent

In the United States, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has declared that “the age of fasting is from the completion of the eighteenth year to the beginning of the sixtieth.”

The USCCB also allows the substitution of some other form of penance for abstinence on all Fridays of the year, except for the Fridays of Lent. The rules for fasting and abstinence in the United States are:

- Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and every other Friday or Lent.
- Every person between the ages of 18 and 59 must fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting consists of one full meal per day, with two smaller meals that do not add up to a full meal, and no snacks.

Lenten Stations of the Cross & Soup Suppers

Stations of the Cross is a traditional devotion focusing on the events of the passion and suffering of Jesus, Our Savior. Stations of the Cross consists of 14 stations, highlighting the events of Jesus' last day as a human being.



Stations of the Cross is a mini-pilgrimage. As the group moves from station to station, the scene is described. Followers hear about the event along the way of the cross, pray, sing and meditate. It is common practice to offer this devotion on the Fridays of Lent.

St. Matthias will offer the Stations of the Cross each Friday during Lent at 6:00 pm followed by a simple soup supper. Each week, a different scriptural based text will be used. Leaders will provide booklets for participants to use as they pray the 14 stations.

All are welcome. We encourage parishioners to bring their own bowl and spoon. You may also choose to bring a vegetarian soup or bread and butter to share with the group. Drinks will be provided.

Friday, April 12th, Stations of the Cross will be hosted by our Readers and will follow "Stations of the Cross—A Journey in Prayer," by Timothy Radcliffe.

RCIA—The Scrutinies

At the Rite of Election on Sunday, March 10, several hundred catechumens and candidates for the Sacraments of Initiation gathered at St. Mary's Cathedral. Archbishop Cordileone blessed them and asked everyone in the Archdiocese to keep them in prayer as they continue their spiritual journey to the Easter Vigil.

At our 10:30 Mass on the 3rd, 4th and 5th Sundays of Lent, our catechumen (elect), Jessica Sanchez will participate in the Scrutinies. At the Easter Vigil, Jessica will be Baptized, then receive Confirmation and Eucharist.

The Scrutinies are ancient rites of the Church which are intended to "heal all that is sinful and bring out, then strengthen, all that is upright, strong and good" in the elect. These Scrutinies (prayers) are about the overwhelming grace of God and grace-filled encounters with the healing power of the Spirit.
