

Fr. Tom's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Today's Gospel reading from Matthew is a prelude to what will become the revelation of Jesus as the Bread of Life. This is referred to as the "Bread of Life Discourse." In the Book of Kings and then again in the Gospel passage of Matthew, we have a juxtaposition of Elisha and Jesus calling for the people to be fed. In the case of Elisha, his servant objects to his request to feed the masses because of lack of food. Elisha, trusting in God's providence to provide for the needs of his people, insists. This scene is a foretelling of John's account of the multiplication of loaves and fishes. In a similar way, Jesus asks Philip where he can buy enough food to feed the five thousand people who have gathered around Jesus. The disciple Andrew, not unlike Elisha's servant, protests that there is no way the limited amount of loaves and fishes can possibly feed the crowd. Despite the obvious parallels and similarities in both of these accounts, Jesus alone is the Bread of Life.

There is rich symbolism in Jesus recognizing the needs of the people around him. Jesus is sensitive and aware that people are hungry and need to be fed. In responding to them, he not only addresses the practical, temporal needs of others but also points them to hope. That there are left-overs points to the reality that for those who trust in God's providential care, the availability of God's grace is without limit, overflowing for those who seek it.

This scene of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes is instructive for us as we face moments of limitation and doubt in our own lives. We sometimes have situations which on the surface seem impossible to face or overcome. It is true that the outcomes we desire do not always conform to or meet our expectations. This is reality. We can easily become dispirited and discouraged. Yet, one of the great blessings and gifts of Christian maturity is to face each situation and reflect on how God is present in that circumstance. What is God trying to say to us and where is he leading us. This discernment and reflection can lead us to a deeper experience of God's presence in our lives and where we come to know in a profound way that God answers our pleas and satisfies our hungry hearts.

The words of Saint Paul to the Ephesians read in today's Second Reading help us to reflect upon the challenges but also the necessity of bonding together as authentic Christians. I encourage each of us to take some time this week to re-read and reflect upon these words: **"I urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one Spirit, as you were also called to the one hope of your call; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all..."**

Help St. Matthias' Financial Security—Consider Stock or IRA Contributions

Did you know you can donate to the church directly from brokerage account?

A charitable contribution of long-term (owned over one year) appreciated securities is one of the most tax-efficient ways to donate to the Church. Long-term appreciated securities with unrealized gains may be donated to the Church and a tax deduction taken for the full fair market value of the securities. Since the securities are donated rather than sold, the capital gains taxes no longer apply. You get a full deduction for the securities and don't pay taxes on the gain! The more appreciation the securities have, the greater the tax savings will be. You can reach out to Sabrina Harper for an Archdiocese form that can be used to make the request through your broker. Consult a tax professional for specific guidance.

If you are over 70 ½ you may be able to meet your minimum required distribution from your IRA.

Making a donation to St. Matthias directly from an IRA may provide a way to effectively claim a tax deduction and meet your IRA minimum distribution requirements for those 70 ½ and older. These are referred to as Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD). Reach out to Sabrina Harper for the form that can be used to make the request through your broker. Our Call to Justice & Charity: The Two Feet of Love *in Action*

Our Ecuadorian Pilgrimage came to an end on July 4th. The participants were prompted to reflect upon and consider the following questions: What experience was the most meaningful for you? Which encounter was the most life-changing or impactful? How did this trip challenge or surprise you?

Following is the next paper received from **Benjamin Schembri**. Benjamin will also be a sophomore at Sequoia High School in the fall. His family is well-known at St. Matthias, Noah sings in the choir, Benjamin, his brother Daniel and sister, Sarah are altar servers. His parents, Katherine and Jerry help organize the Kids' Carnival at Oktoberfest along with many other things!

Benjamin's reflection paper will appear in two parts. Here is part one:

Going to Ecuador had never crossed my mind before my older brother Noah went on this trip. When he got back he told me all the great things that he had done while he was there. Two years later, Sabrina Harper told me that she was going on this trip to Ecuador again. This was going to be my first time I've ever been out of the country without my family.

I was scared about going out on my own with a bunch of boys, some of whom I had never known before. I roomed with Chicco, Charlie, and Ryan M. Of the boys on the trip, I knew Charlie and Ryan from Sequoia High School and I had known Chicco from middle school youth ministry at St. Matthias. All of us boys in our room had been in the same confirmation class too. While I did not know Ryan T., Brendan and Buddy, I got to know them well and enjoyed their company over the course of our trip.

We arrived in Guayaquil late in the day on Wednesday. The next day we had breakfast, eggs, ham and toast, at 8 a.m. Later, we walked down to Casa Damien with the directors, Nathan and Germania, who were very welcoming. First, we talked about Leprosy with Nathan and he asked what we knew about it. He told us that it's called Hansen's Disease because leprosy is a bad term to use. After that we went to meet all the people in the compound at Casa Damien. We went and met the seven women first and the ones I remember the most are Esther, Sister Luz and Elvia. We then walked over to the open patio of the men's quarters. The local Rotary Club made it so the floor was not just dirt. It was now tile so that wheelchairs

could go across the floor. We all introduced ourselves to the men and by then it was close to the end of the day. Afterwards we went to the grocery store to buy snacks and water, then Diego our driver drove us back to the hostel.

The next day we went to Damien House. We went to the art room to put our stuff away (which is where we put all of our stuff throughout the trip), then we split into groups and one of the groups went to the men's section and the other group went to the ladies section. My group played Chinese checkers with the ladies which was really fun. It was good therapy for their hands moving the little balls across the board. After that we went to Mass at the Chapel. We brought all the men to their living spaces and then had lunch with the staff and helpers at Casa Damien. After lunch we all got in the car to head to the school, Nuevo Mundo. It took about 20 minutes to get there, and once we arrived we met Pat, the founder of the school. Pat is a very good friend of Sister Annie, who is the founder of Casa Damien. She took us all into a room and instructed us to ask her questions about the school. She then asked us what we wanted to be when we grow up. A bunch of us said that we wanted to be Engineers. Then she told us that things can change. She advised us that we should be teachers so we can teach kids like the ones in Ecuador English so their lives could be a lot better. Pat was a nice lady and we enjoyed our time with her. She then introduced us to Jocelyn & her classroom. We spoke to Jocelyn's class and had them ask questions in English and we would answer them in English. After we were done with the class, we toured the school and then left for a tour of Duran.
