

Fr. Tom's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

A central theme of today's readings speaks to us of discernment. In the Book of Proverbs, we hear it proclaimed that we should "forsake foolishness that you may live; advance in the way of understanding." We cannot begin to understand or pursue knowledge unless we are quiet and attentive to the wisdom God seeks to impart to us. Two spiritual tools that help us to advance in understanding include vigilance and discernment. The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines vigilance as "the state of being constantly attentive and responsive to signs of opportunity, activities, or danger." The first reading from the Book of Wisdom beautifully expresses this attentiveness. Wisdom prepares a place for people to sit, eat and drink so as to be nourished and fortified, forsake foolishness and pursue understanding. Our relationship with God continually calls us to perfect our attentiveness and vigilance. When we pray, when we contemplate and meditate upon how God is speaking in our lives, more and more we grow in wisdom. We are able to grow in knowledge and understanding of the things of God, and surrender and let go of those things, often distractions, which impede our capacity to be receptive and open to God's call for us.

Saint Ignatius of Loyola defines discernment as "motions of the soul." "These interior movements consist of thoughts, imaginings, emotions, inclinations, desires, feelings, repulsions, and attractions." (IgnatianSpirituality.com/Loyola Press, Chicago). As we see, these "motions of the soul" are varied, many, and often complex. We can become overwhelmed by these emotions in light of decisions we have to make. One of the graces and fruits of discernment is that it allows us to acknowledge desires and decisions to be made. We then reflect upon them and pray in the light of trying to understand what the will of God is for us. Saint Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians, accentuates the themes of wisdom, understanding and discernment. This was such an integral and important part of his own conversion experience and journey of reconciliation with the Lord. "Watch carefully how you live, not as foolish persons but as wise, making most of the opportunity...to try to understand the will of the Lord."

This Pauline theme is played out so clearly in today's Gospel reading from John. The quarreling amongst the crowds reacting to Jesus' revelation that he is the "living bread come down from heaven" reflects their understanding as to what Jesus is trying to teach them. They took the message of Jesus quite literally as they thought he was speaking about cannibalism. Jesus echoes the same message we heard in last Sunday's Gospel. We have come to understand that Jesus is the Bread of Life as we have built a relationship with him. Jesus Christ has come to abide in us and us in Him through our reception of the Blessed Sacrament. It is also our relationship with Jesus that helps us come to know more profoundly the Father. The Father sent the Son to draw us back into a relationship rooted in love and mercy, culminating, as a gift of our Baptism, in eternal life. We live that relationship first here on earth as we seek to reflect in our own lives the loving relationship between God and His Son. May we pray for God's grace to be made worthy of the promises of Christ!

CREATING A CULTURE OF GENEROSITY

St. Matthias' fiscal year runs from July 1st through June 30th. Budgets are reviewed and finalized during the month of July. Our Finance Council has approved a budget for 2018-2019 which is not balanced due to rising expenses and weekend collections which have remained relatively flat as compared to our expenses.

Our parish community is generous. Whenever we make our needs known, parishioners respond and our needs are met. With this in mind, our Finance Council has created this series of "Collection Thoughts" which will be included in the bulletin each week leading up to and after our **Town Hall Meeting on Sunday**,

Sept 9th in order to educate the parish community about our financial situation and to ask for your prayerful consideration. If you already give regularly - we thank you! If you give sometimes - please consider giving more regularly. If you do not contribute financially to the parish community - please consider giving what you can.

Collection Thought #3

Each week we collect about 100 trackable donations (money given by check, in offertory envelopes or via electronic donations) which represents about ½ of registered parishioners. With so few contributing financially, this prevents us from offering more programs and making needed improvements. If 5 additional families began making weekly financial contributions, it would help lighten the load for those 100 families.

Our Call to Justice & Charity: The Two Feet of Love *in Action*

Our Ecuadorian Pilgrimage came to an end on July 4th. The participants were prompted to reflect upon and consider the following questions: What experience was the most meaningful for you? Which encounter was the most life-changing or impactful? How did this trip challenge or surprise you?

Following is the next paper received from **Chicco Adamo**. Chicco will also be a sophomore at Woodside High School in the fall.

The Ecuadorian Pilgrimage trip was a life changing experience for me because it showed me a wonderful yet struggling world I could have never imagined, and also gave me the chance to meet some of the kindest and happiest people I have ever met. The patients at Casa Damian and the people we visited in Quito welcomed us and shared their customs and cultures with us.

If I had to choose one event that really touched me, I would have to say that it was the dinner we had with the women at Casa Damien. After cleaning their windows, they invited all of us over for a delicious dinner. Apparently we were the first group that they ever invited to a dinner like that, and that alone really makes me feel like we did something that truly benefited the people there. Knowing that they took time out of their really busy lives in order to host a bunch of gringos they just met really touched me. Everytime we were inside of their living area I felt so welcomed, as if I were to have walked back into my house after a long vacation. During the dinner, we sat next to the patients, but even though it was hard to converse with them the fact that they wanted us to spend time with them made it actually feel easier to. It sounds a bit crazy but I swear that night was the easiest time I could understand the patients, and it almost seemed like a force inside of me nudged me on and gave me the right words to reply to them. As a result, that night was the most magical for me and will always hold onto the memories I shared with the patients at

Casa Damian and the rest of the Ecuadorian Pilgrimage group.

This trip was honestly so much fun and heart warming, and the most important reason I would go back to Ecuador would be to see all of the people we have met there and to see how they are doing. The people down there don't have nearly as good living conditions as we do in California, but they are still so happy with what they have. I feel like that is a phenomenon that can only really be understood by creating friendships with these wonderful people.

Information for Tenants from our Justice and Charity Commission

Evie Dwyer, a member of our Justice and Charity Commission, recently attended a meeting sponsored by "Fair Rents of Redwood City" led by Diana Reddy.

The main speaker had organized tenants in her apartment building on Clinton Street. She called her talk "Due Diligence 101" and offered the following advice:

- 1) Keep a detailed communications log concerning your landlord and maintenance issues.
- 2) Follow up verbal communication with email to confirm the details of the conversation.
- 3) Take photos and/or videos of maintenance or security issues.
- 4) Document, document, document every time you call or write to someone about the issues at hand.
- 5) Send your rent certified mail, return receipt to avoid late fees.

Altar Servers Needed

All children, after receiving their First Communion, are eligible to become Altar Servers. The Altar Server provides a very important ministry at each Mass. Servers assist the priest and deacon in the procession to the altar, holding the Roman Missal for prayers, helping to set the table and leading the recession at the conclusion of Mass.

Deacon Rich provides training for new servers. A guidebook will also be provided to parents so they can be supportive. New servers will also be paired with experienced servers during the first year of this ministry.

gins in October. We need more altar servers to help us ensure that we have Altar Servers at all of our weekend Masses. Adults who are interested in serving at Mass are also invited to serve and should contact Deacon Rich.

Becoming A Fully Initiated Catholic - RCIA

Do you know someone who has thought about becoming Catholic or, for whatever reason, has been baptized but has not been confirmed or received Holy Communion? What does it mean to become fully initiated into the Roman Catholic Church? Do you or someone you know have questions about the sacraments and what it means to be a Catholic? Please consider RCIA.

The Catholic Church has a process for adults to discern whether God is inviting them to learn more about our faith and, perhaps, to become Catholic. This process is also a pathway to complete the Sacraments of Initiation for those already Baptized (Confirmation, Eucharist).

This process is called RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). The RCIA process provides guided weekly sessions on the fundamental beliefs of our faith including an understanding of the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist (Mass). In addition, the process emphasizes prayer, discernment and spiritual formation as each candidate responds to their call to become followers of Jesus through the Catholic Church.

RCIA sessions will be held on Sunday mornings from 9:15-10:15 a.m. in the rectory. The first RCIA gathering will be held on Sunday, September 16th. Parishioners, who would like to participate as an RCIA team member and support our candidates, are welcome.

Deacon Rich and Deacon David will lead and facilitate RCIA sessions. If you have any questions, know of someone who would like to discuss joining RCIA, are considering being a team member, or would just like to experience the RCIA process, please contact Deacon Rich before or after Mass or email him at rich@stmatthiasparish.org.


