

A Letter from Archbishop Cordileone

August 17, 2018

My Dear People of the Archdiocese of San Francisco,

The recent reports of episcopal negligence and malfeasance in the face of clerical sexual abuse, coupled with some reports of bishops themselves guilty of sexual predation, have reopened old wounds and inflicted new ones on victims, their families, the Catholic faithful at large, and indeed, the larger society. This has been further fueled by a spirit of raw ambition on the part of some, who will stop at nothing to advance their careers and climb the ecclesial corporate ladder over investing themselves in serving the people of God. Such behavior on the part of Church leaders is despicable, reprehensible, and absolutely unbecoming of a man of God.

I have emphasized this point to the seminarians of our Archdiocese in my recent summer meetings with them, and made it very clear that their vocation as diocesan priests is to serve God's people where they are most needed in our local church. This was not difficult to do. I am inspired by their purity of motivation, their great love for Christ and his Church, and their desire to be faithful servant leaders.

I have been in conversation with the administration at St. Patrick Seminary, who have conducted a review of their policies on issues involving sexual abuse and harassment. While the policies are thorough, I intend to discuss with the Seminary and its Board of Trustees ideas on how to more effectively implement these policies and ensure that they are followed. I intend to do the same with regard to the policies of the Archdiocese with my Cabinet at the Pastoral Center. These policies, and information on how to report abuse, are available on our Archdiocesan website (<https://sfarchdiocese.org/protecting-children>).

While attending to policies and procedures is necessary, by itself it is really superficial. What is called for at this time is penance in reparation for sins against faith and morals. This is how we keep the righteous indignation that so many of us feel at this time from becoming an anger that divides the Body of Christ.

Last year, in response to a request from some of the faithful of our Archdiocese, I consecrated the Archdiocese to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. This was on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the apparitions of our Lady at Fatima. At that time, I asked our people to live this consecration by observing what our Blessed Mother asked of us there. I now ask our priests and people to engage in prayer, penance and adoration as an act of reparation for sins against chastity and the reverence due to the Blessed Sacrament, in accordance with our Lady's wishes.

I repeat here what I asked of you then, and implore you even more earnestly to join me in: Praying the rosary daily – and for families, to pray the rosary as a family at least once a week; Practicing Friday penance by abstaining from eating meat and one other additional act of fasting (e.g., another form of food or drink, or skipping a meal); Spending one hour of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament at least once a week.

After consulting with the Presbyteral Council of the Archdiocese and my Cabinet, moreover, I will designate a day when together we will make an act of reparation, and how that will be conducted. While I pledge to attend to policies and their observance, we all must be engaged at this time on the spiritual level. Without prayer, penance and adoration in reparation for the horrendous sins rampant in our Church for very many years now, any efforts of the temporal order will be meaningless.

In the meantime, I ask you, our people to stay close to your parish priest. Our priests make great sacrifices to serve their people with generosity and compassion. They are there for you, attentive to providing you pastoral care. I am grateful to them for their labors in the Lord's vineyard, and pray that the divine assistance may be with them as they minister to you during this time of crisis.

CREATING A CULTURE OF GENEROSITY

St. Matthias' fiscal year runs from July 1st through June 30th. Budgets are reviewed and finalized during the month of July. Our Finance Council has approved a budget for 2018-2019 which is not balanced due to rising expenses and weekend collections which have remained relatively flat as compared to our expenses.

Our parish community is generous. Whenever we make our needs known, parishioners respond and our needs are met. With this in mind, our Finance Council has created this series of "Collection Thoughts" which will be included in the bulletin each week leading up to and after our **Town Hall Meeting on Sunday,**

Collection Thought #4

Remember that St. Matthias is fully funded by YOU. We do not receive money from the Archdiocese or St. Matthias Preschool. We do not have meaningful savings to draw upon. We have not had endowments of real estate or sizable stock donations. Our Call to Justice & Charity: The Two Feet of Love *in Action*

Our Ecuadorian Pilgrimage came to an end on July 4th. The participants were prompted to reflect upon and consider the following questions: What experience was the most meaningful for you? Which encounter was the most life-changing or impactful? How did this trip challenge or surprise you?

Following is the paper received from **Ryan McAfee**. Ryan will also be a sophomore at Sequoia High School in the fall.

There were two things that shocked me greatly throughout my time in Ecuador. The first one is the contrast that plagues the country in what I feel can only be described as a negative way. In Guayaquil, one had to drive for only ten minutes before the luxurious gated communities turned into crumbling concrete houses. Fifteen minutes to arrive at shacks made of cane, surrounded by trash, next to a heavily polluted canal. In Quito, people with all of the world's modern amenities could be neighbors with people who had no bathroom or five people sleeping in one room. It was terrifying. On a happier note, the second thing that shocked me was the hospitality and the undying joy of all the families and people we met. I don't think I've ever seen people with such positivity living in such poor conditions.

First, more about the contrast. I wasn't kidding when I described the scale of it. More people in Ecuador live in poverty than I ever could have imagined. For all the wealth I saw, there was ALWAYS more poverty. It's made worse by the fact that poverty is a much different meaning in the U.S.. Here, if someone wants to break the cycle of poverty, there are ways to get a good education, ways to be able to provide for your family, and support whenever you ask for it. In Ecuador, many of the good and safe schools cost too much money, most of the available jobs are minimum wage and dangerous, and there are very few places (Centro de Muchachos Trabajador being one of them) to get help in a time of need.

Second, I want to talk about the hospitality and joy I experienced in Ecuador. On our first day in Guayaquil, we met the patients at Casa Damian. When we walked through the door to both the women's section and the men's section, we were greeted with smiling faces, laughing, and a bright "Buenas Dias!". Even though they didn't even know us, they still welcomed us into their home and made it clear throughout the week that it was our home too. Whether it was through Dominoes with the men or through talking with the women, it became clear to me that they were genuinely happy to have us with them.

When the time came for us to leave, they threw us a good-bye party and everybody smiled the whole time. We then left with a ciao rather than with a Adios (to God) because we knew we would see each other again.

Finally, I want to address how these experiences matter to everyone reading this. Poverty isn't just bad, it's terrifying for both those who see it, and those who experience it. We can help people around the world by using the hand that we were dealt to help make lives better. I know from experience that in Ecuador, a donated dollar goes a long way. Also, we should let them help us with our attitude. By looking at their culture, it is clear to see that everybody, even strangers, are treated as family. I feel very strongly that if everybody treated everybody that way, as a loved one, then maybe the world would become a bit of a better place. By you doing both these things the world will be a better place.

Information for Tenants from our Justice and Charity Commission

Evie Dwyer, a member of our Justice and Charity Commission, recently attended a meeting sponsored by "Fair Rents of Redwood City" led by Diana Reddy.

The main speaker had organized tenants in her apartment building on Clinton Street. She called her talk "Due Diligence 101" and offered the following advice: 1) Keep a detailed communications log concerning your landlord and maintenance issues. 2) Follow up verbal communication with email to confirm the details of the conversation. 3) Take photos and/or videos of maintenance or security issues. 4) Document, document, document every time you call or write to someone about the issues at hand. 5) Send your rent certified mail, return receipt to avoid late fees.

Altar Servers Needed

All children, after receiving their First Communion, are eligible to become Altar Servers. The Altar Server provides a very important ministry at each Mass. Servers assist the priest and deacon in the procession to the altar, holding the Roman Missal for prayers, helping to set the table and leading the recession at the conclusion of Mass.

Deacon Rich provides training for new servers. A guidebook will also be provided to parents so they can be supportive. New servers will also be paired with experienced servers during the first year of this ministry.

We need more altar servers to help us ensure that we have Altar Servers at all of our weekend Masses. Adults who are interested in serving at Mass are also invited to serve and should contact Deacon Rich.

Becoming A Fully Initiated Catholic – RCIA

Do you know someone who has thought about becoming Catholic or, for whatever reason, has been baptized but has not been confirmed or received Holy Communion? What does it mean to become fully initiated into the Roman Catholic Church? Do you or someone you know have questions about the sacraments and what it means to be a Catholic? Please consider RCIA.

The Catholic Church has a process for adults to discern whether God is inviting them to learn

more about our faith and, perhaps, to become Catholic. This process is also a pathway to complete the Sacraments of Initiation for those already Baptized (Confirmation, Eucharist).

This process is called RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). The RCIA process provides guided weekly sessions on the fundamental beliefs of our faith including an understanding of the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist (Mass). In addition, the process emphasizes prayer, discernment and spiritual formation as each candidate responds to their call to become followers of Jesus through the Catholic Church.

RCIA sessions will be held on Sunday mornings from 9:15-10:15 a.m. in the rectory. The first RCIA gathering will be held on Sunday, September 16th. Parishioners, who would like to participate as an RCIA team member and support our candidates, are welcome.

Deacon Rich and Deacon David will lead and facilitate RCIA sessions. If you have any questions, know of someone who would like to discuss joining RCIA, are considering being a team member, or would just like to experience the RCIA process, please contact Deacon Rich before or after Mass or email him at rich@stmatthiasparish.org.


