Father Tom's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Today's readings, most particularly the first reading from the Book of Numbers and the Gospel passage from Saint Mark, pose very real and human challenges for us. As I first read and prayed over these readings, I must honestly say I winced a little bit. These readings contain human features or characteristics of envy and jealousy, a sense of entitlement and superiority, and territorialism. When we exhibit these sentiments, it becomes evident at some point that these are not of God. Why is that? One way I answer this question in prayer is to posit this thought: Is God's Spirit exclusive, reserved only for few "chosen" ones? Is it God's initiative or our own that causes us to guard sometimes jealously "our" ministerial work, at the exclusion of others? Does our call to missionary discipleship become more about ourselves than about openly and freely sharing the Good News with others? These are difficult and searing questions, to be sure; yet they are also the key which, through an examination of conscience, unlock a deeper and more authentic encounter with the one whom we seek to serve: Jesus Christ.

In the first reading, we hear of the Lord taking some of the spirit that was given to Moses and spreading it around. It is understandable that the young man, clearly in awe of the prophetic mission of Moses, becomes rattled when he sees Elad and Medad preaching. Moses rebukes him, asking, "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the people of the Lord were prophets! Would that the Lord might bestow his spirit on them all." These words of Moses reflect a healthy self-possession and self-awareness. There is a true sense of liberation as Moses acknowledges the generosity of God's spirit. Because of his own intimate relationship with God, with its moments of serenity and others of anger and doubt, Moses wants others to experience and then share the intimacy of God's spirit. Saint Paul often affirms that although we as the Body of Christ have unique gifts and talents, challenges and aspirations, we are all fundamentally united by God's love, God's Spirit.

Jesus himself encounters this same inclination to covet from his own disciples. "Teacher, we saw someone driving out demons in your name, and we tried to prevent him because he does not follow us." Jesus knows the personalities of his disciples all too well and as the Good Shepherd he teaches them fundamental lessons of life. Not unlike the young man we read about in Numbers, the disciples at heart possess a good motivation. They want to watch out and protect their mentor, their leader. Yet this motivation is misguided. In their action of control, they are limiting and inhibiting the work of discipleship to flourish. Jesus tells them: "Whoever is not against us is for us." These are salient words as we continue to reflect honestly upon our own discipleship and ministerial service to the Church. What is it that truly motivates our service in whatever form or shape that takes? Is it the need to control and dominate, to do it our own way? As Jesus so compassionately taught his disciples, this disposition or attitude divides and poisons the Body of Christ. We pray for the grace to see that each of us plays a part in building up the Church. What helps to remember this truth is an deeper truth: it is God who wills us to the service to which we are called. This is indeed God's initiative, not ours. Our work is to respond to that call in freedom, generosity, and joy!



Blessing of the Animals

Saturday, October 6th at 4:30 pm | St. Matthias Church Parking Lot

As autumn arrives, people in various places may notice something odd.

A procession of animals, everything from dogs and cats to hamsters and even horses, is led to churches for a special ceremony called the Blessing of Animals. This custom is conducted in remembrance of Saint Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures.

Francis, whose feast day is October 4th, loved the larks flying about his hilltop town. He and his early brothers, staying in a small hovel, allowed themselves to be displaced by a donkey.

Francis wrote a Canticle of the Creatures, an ode

to God's living things. "All praise to you, Oh Lord, for all these brother and sister creatures." And there was testimony in the cause for Saint Clare of Assisi's canonization that referred to her little cat!

The Blessing of the Animals usually goes like this:

"Blessed are you, Lord God, maker of all living creatures. You called forth fish in the sea, birds in the air and animals on the land. You inspired Saint Francis to call all of them his brothers and sisters. We ask you to bless this pet. By the power of your love, enable it to live according to your plan. May we always praise you for all your beauty in creation. Blessed are you, Lord our God, in all your creatures! Amen."

All are invited to bring their pets for this special celebration!
