Fr. Tom's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Today's Gospel passage from Mark offers an excellent opportunity to reflect upon the nature of sacrifice, particularly in a spiritual context. We have the scenario of people of great wealth giving to the treasury. Yet, their giving comes from a surplus; thus, their giving "doesn't really cost them anything." However, the woman who gives the least, a few coins, gives much more because to give at all cost comes at great personal cost to her. It actually hurts to give, but it is that self-sacrificial giving that expresses the true nature of Christ-centered giving. To be sure, it is always pleasing to God to give. No doubt, the wealthy individuals in this account are not bad people and their giving is indeed honorable. The challenge, however, is to give not just what is convenient to give. As Jesus points out to his disciples, "For they had all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all that she had, her whole livelihood."

I recall some years ago, as a Jesuit seminarian, when I was confronted with such a scenario. The Jesuit seminarians living in Los Angeles were invited to have lunch at Good Shepherd Convent, where there was wonderful ministry for single mothers and their children. Many of these women lived in poverty and were recent immigrants from Mexico and Central America. The women put together a great feast for us. It was obvious the love and care they had put into the meal. One such mother came up to me and offered me some food. My response was, "Thank you very much, but I am not hungry." Standing next to me was Stephen, a fellow Jesuit novice. He pulled me away and began to rebuke me. He said, "That was so rude of you. She offered something of herself to you and you rejected it." This exchange took place many years ago and it remains with me today. I felt totally ashamed and embarrassed. Stephen was challenging me and rightly so. I had failed to acknowledge the sacrifice it took for this mother to prepare a gift of herself for us. I have meditated and prayed about that conversation many times. "She, from her poverty, has contributed all that she had, her whole livelihood."

The very nature of giving can be a struggle at times. Especially within our consumer culture and society which places so much emphasis on money and possessions, even giving takes on a competitive edge. This past Saturday I attended the Funeral Mass for a remarkable woman, Sister M. John Martin Fixa, O.P. Several years ago Sister John began the "Dominican Sisters Vision of Hope," an organization created to raise money to support the education of school children from impoverished backgrounds whose parents could not afford to send their children to Catholic school. I served on the Board for several years and Sister raised millions of dollars. Although there were many wealthy donors, I vividly remember Sister treating with equal respect and dignity those who gave five or ten dollars. She never belittled or minimized the poor who gave. She honored and respected their sacrifice made out of love.

Let us remember in a special way the women and men who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States. As we pause as a national community to commemorate Veterans Day, let us be grateful to those who have made sacrifices in the service of others. Serving as a member of the Armed Forces often requires great personal sacrifices and can be very difficult for families. Let us honor them by our prayers and gratitude. May we also remember those who have given the last, full measure of their lives, those in the military services who died in the line of duty.


Pastoral Care of the Sick


Why the Rosary, Why Now?


Rejoice! Advent Retreat


