



Fr. Tom's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Blessed Miguel Agustin Pro, S.J., was born on January 31, 1891 in Guadalupe, Mexico. He was one of eleven children. He studied at the Jesuit novitiate in Michoacan and was ordained a priest. During a time of great persecution of the Church in Mexico amidst civil and social unrest, President Calles instituted a campaign against the Church. Like many others, Father Pro was arrested. It is said that his disposition before his death was one of joy and serenity. When an army officer escorted Father Pro to his place of execution, Pro said to him, "***Not only do I pardon you, but I am grateful to you, and I shall pray for you.***" *Imagine! On November 23, 1917, this thirty-six year old Jesuit priest was executed, but not before uttering the words, "Viva Cristo Rey!" (Long live Jesus Christ the King!).*

Today the Church celebrates the Feast of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. This marks the end of Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar as we prepare for the holy season of waiting and expectation, Advent. The life and heroic discipleship of Blessed Miguel Pro is a powerful example of what the kingship of Jesus Christ is all about: the joyful willingness to lay down our lives for the faith, to be merciful and forgiving even in the most difficult of circumstances. This profound humility points us to what true kingship in the Lord is all about. We often, and rightly so, look to the heroic virtues of the saints and blessed as examples of how we should live holy and righteous lives. It is important, however, to reflect on how we can emulate the kingship of Jesus in our own lives. We will not always be called to the heroic acts as portrayed by the lives of the saints; however, each day the Lord invites us to heroic action as we try to be loving, forgiving, and compassionate in the time and place the Lord has called us to be.

In so many ways, as a community of faith, we have innumerable examples of quiet heroism. We have parishioners who are caring for sick parents; mentoring and navigating children and young people in these sometimes ambiguous and challenging times; couples trying to understand and grow together; seniors who are facing daunting medical difficulties; others who give unassumingly of their time and treasure to help those in our community who are facing economic hardship. Each of these examples, in their own unique way, models the kingship of Jesus Christ. It is a kingship predicated upon humility and service, a surrendering of oneself for another. It is a self-sacrificial loving and giving; it is unconditional and seeks nothing in return. In the second reading from Revelation, it is said that "Jesus Christ is the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead and ruler of the kings of the earth." We know from our own relationship to Jesus that he is indeed faithful, he is indeed the witness to the fidelity and obedience to his Father.

As we celebrate the kingship of Jesus Christ, let us ask the Father to help us, through His grace and the Holy Spirit, to be faithful witnesses of the Father's love. May we be willing to surrender the defenses of our own comfort zone and capitulate to the will of the One who loved us first and who invites us, day by day, to love Him in return.



Ken Preston *God Walks with Us: The Catholic Church's Response to the Refugee Crisis*


Joe Paprocki *Practicing a Living Faith—5 Principles that Shape a Robust Catholic Vision*

Monday, December 24th at 4:30 pm | Church


