

Fr. Tom's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. We have just celebrated the great feast of the Incarnation, the birth of Jesus Christ. Situated so closely to this great act of salvation history, we take time to reflect upon the wonder of family life. The interconnectedness of the Holy Family is instrumental to our understanding of divine love. In the first reading from Sirach, he speaks of the bonds of love, charity, and honor. These are the foundational roots that are essential to healthy family life. Even more fundamentally, these roots are predicated upon humility and freedom to serve others, to be disposed to the needs of others. This is played out in a very practical way in the relationship between parents and children. Parents seek to protect and nurture their children who are utterly dependent upon them for shelter, nourishment, and guidance. This requires, in many cases, the surrendering of one's own will and desires, setting them aside for another. The Holy Family, then, serves as a role model and example of how true surrender, obedience and surrender brings such holiness and grace.

We know from reading the Scriptures that the conditions of Jesus's birth and the circumstances surrounding it for Mary and Joseph were fraught with uncertainty. Perhaps this is so, in part, so that all families can come to understand that God empathizes with and understands to sometimes very complex nature of family life. On the one hand, Jesus was born in a manger, a place where animals went to be fed. There is an irony and juxtaposition in that precisely in the manger the one who is truly the Bread of Life, the one who feeds and nourishes, bursts forth on the human scene. This teaches us that God is present to us and His grace abounds even in the most unlikely places and circumstances.

Mary herself experienced this mystery when the Holy Family goes to Jerusalem for the Passover Feast and when it is over Jesus remains behind. Mary and Joseph naturally become concerned when they realize Jesus has not returned home with them in the pilgrimage. When they face them, he reveals his mission to the Father. Luke tells us that Mary "kept all these things in her heart." Mary and Joseph thus become models for us of how to keep the things of God close to our hearts, helping us to ponder the mystery of God's plan of salvation operative in our own lives.

On this Feast Day, please be assured of my daily prayers for all of you and your families. Family life is a tremendous gift but also presents many challenges for us. May we continue to support one another and build up our families, our domestic church!
