Abstinence

Everyone fourteen years of age and older is bound to abstain from meat on the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

Fast Everyone between the ages of eighteen and sixty years of age are bound to fast on Good Friday. On this day, the law of fast allows only one full meal a day, but does not

prohibit some food during the day, so long as this does not constitute another full meal. Drinking during the day is permitted. When health of ability to work would be seriously affected, this does not oblige. In doubt concerning fast or abstinence, a priest assigned to pastoral ministry or confessor should be consulted. In the spirit of penance, the faithful should not lightly excuse themselves from this obligation. Fasting helps us uncluttered our minds and hearts of excess so that we can focus and reflect on our ongoing conversion.

Nicene Creed

What are the RCIA Scrutinies?

The RCIA initiation rites for the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent are called

"scrutinizes" which is not a very comforting name. The purpose of these rites is to engage the elect in examination, reflection and prayer. The rites are pastoral in nature and also call on the whole community to pray for our elect.

This year, St. Matthias and St. Charles have two individuals preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil. They are Ken Purdy (St. Charles) and Joey Latham (St. Matthias). In addition, James Babcock (St. Matthias) is a baptized Christian and will be fully initiated into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil Mass.

The Scruntinies developed as a tradition from the earliest days of the Church (examination, laying on of hands, prayers of exorcism). After the Second Vatican Council, the Church stated that the purpose of each scrutiny is "to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, of sinful in the hearts of the elect and to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong and good." (RCIA, #141)

The intercessions are a critical element within the scrutinies with a focus on being heartfelt. The Scrutinies will be celebrated within Mass according to the following schedule: Third Sunday of Lent, St. Matthias, 9:45 am Fourth Sunday of Lent, St. Matthias, 9:45 am Fifth Sunday of Lent, St. Charles, 8:30 am Please keep our candidates, their sponsors, and the members of the RCIA team in your prayers.

Pray — Plan — Pledge: AAA 2021

At the end of February, we kicked-off the Archdiocesan Annual Appeal -- an annual tax that we are assessed. Our St. Matthias community have been very generous especially during this pandemic. One of the strengths of our community is to respond to the needs of our parish.

Each year, the Archdiocesan Annual Appeal provides financial resources to support the work of the Archdiocesan. We benefit from the centralized services such as payroll, liturgical guidance, and outreach programs especially to the most needy in our greater community.

Last year, we met and exceeded our goal. Monies in excess of our goal were returned to St. Matthias.

So, the not so good news is that it is that time again. The good news is that our assessment is lower this year -- \$58,820.

The theme for this year's appeal is "For the needy will never be forgotten; nor will the hope of the afflicted ever fade." There are lots of needs this year -- our youth, for social justice ministries, for support of our priests and all our parishes.

Our goal at St. Matthias is to meet our AAA target by Pentecost which this year, is at the end of May.

We are asking that you sit down with those in your household and plan your contribution. We are encouraging you to consider pledging your level of giving over the next 10 months. For example, say your family decides to give \$1,000. With a gift, you would submit all \$1,000 at one time. But, with a pledge, you could give \$100 per month for ten months (March-December). With pledges, we know early that we've met our goal. During this pandemic, thoughtful planning is critical for so many things. This week you will receive a letter from Fr. Dave with a brochure.

Malachi, our Finance Council and all the staff, we thank you ahead of time for your thoughtful consideration for this year's annual appeal.

FEAST OF FAITH: Lent, a Season of the Word

Each year on the First Sunday of Lent we hear one of the Gospel accounts of the temptation of Jesus. In Luke's account, the devil cites the scriptures repeatedly, urging Jesus to interpret them in a false, self-serving way—if God sends angels to protect those whom God loves (as it says in Psalm 91), then prove it! But Jesus resists this insidious temptation by turning to scripture passages that tell of right relationship with God living by God's word, trusting in God, and worshiping God alone.

Jesus himself listened to the inspired word of God and let it shape and form him. Through the liturgy, we do the same. The readings we hear at Mass can teach us, but that is not their primary function. Rather, the scriptures are meant to reveal the Lord to us, to let us experience his presence, and to form us in our Christian identity. Christ's presence is realized by his spoken word, "since it is he himself who speaks when the Holy Scriptures are read in the Church" (*Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, 7). In the readings proclaimed at Mass, we hear the voice of Christ himself. –Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
