Fifth Sunday of Easter May 15, 2022

Reading I

Acts 14:21-27

After Paul and Barnabas had proclaimed the good news to that city and made a considerable number of disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch.

They strengthened the spirits of the disciples and exhorted them to persevere in the faith, saying, "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." They appointed elders for them in each church and, with prayer and fasting, commended them to the Lord in whom they had put their faith.

Then they traveled through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia.

After proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia. From there they sailed to Antioch, where they had been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now accomplished.

And when they arrived, they called the church

together and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles.

Missionary Co-Op - June 11-12

On June 11-12, we will welcome a missionary priest from the Diocese of Nakuru, Kenya. Fr. Stephen Ogaro, the Director of the Catholic Diocese of Nakuru Mission Office Incorporated, shared the following about his diocese — Nakuru Diocese covers 6,844 square miles. They face many challenges including illiteracy, cattle rustling, insecurity, outdated cultural practices, lack of infrastructural development, and perennial drought resulting in high dependency on relief food and semi-nomadic lifestyles. Deaths from hunger, malnutrition, and disease are common.

Baringo, begin an arid zone, has experienced severe weather conditions in the recent past, one that has persisted to date. Boreholes, wells, and rivers have dried up especially in the past three years that drought has been severe. It's not uncommon for animal carcasses to be sighted strewn all over the fields, and those alive too weak to walk. This affects humans too. Further, general health has been compromised by the COVID-19 pandemic. Our 2022 priority therefore is to address the food situation and reconstruct ruined livelihoods. With the help from the mission cooperative plan 2022, we envisage to mitigate these challenges by: 1) digging shallow wells to supply safe and clean water, 2) installing sanitation infrastructure systems in schools and public areas to mitigate against infections of the most vulnerable, 3) providing medicine and health education to the poor and malnourished, 4) provide food relief, and support school feeding program of up to 500 children. We look forward to welcoming Fr. Augustine to St. Matthias during his visit on the weekend of June 11-12.
